[The events that occupt contrived, and the characters have not been changed to protect their identity.] What p omparing these two people? The lesson seemed obvious, a foregone conclusion.

rofessional prayers. He addresses God, but focuses on himself. He demonstrates his dness against the unrighteousness of others. Some of these "others" are the unthinkabl nile others are just plain old sinners (*unjust*). And he wouldn't want to forget the obvious ollectors, already referenced by his list. Instead of these unrighteous creatures, the Pha ds that even surpass the requirement of God's law. The prayer positions the Pharisee a ness, according to God's law, that couldn't possibly be ignored from God's favor. Thank remind Him of who gets His favor.
